
#### Ballet Winter Repertory February 25 & 26 at Bell Theatre

### **Dramaturgist's Notes**

Equus is not a play "about" insanity.

Though based on an actual incident, Shaffer's play is no mere case history. In fact, as the author has noted, he "never received confirmed details of the real story." Instead, Shaffer concerned himself "more and more with a different kind of exploration."

Though the play is set in a psychiatric hospital, Alan Strang's case is never clinically diagnosed, nor is the word "insanity" ever straightfordwardly applied to him. The fact that he committed the crime is established at the outset of the play, making it no typical "who-done-it" but a "why-done-it" instead.

Dysart, who is "in fact" a psychiatrist, is also the play's detective, its reluctant High Priest of Normalcy, and its surgeon of the soul. Reconstructing the circumstances of the crime, he reveals its hidden motives—and raises issues with implications far beyond the solitary case at hand: the nature and necessity of worship, the value of passion (and of pain), and the loss of adoration and sacredness in the "normal" modern world, to name a few.
