There is a convention that if a man is a sadist then the women around him will be submissive and suffering. And that may very well be so in many cases, but, it's not necessarily so and I think it's so boring. Oppression in your life is not boring because it's too painful, but, on stage I feel the oppression is more effective when it's not seen directly. It's more effective when everybody is a victim of something.—Maria Irene Fornes
