

ABOUT THE PLAY

The Servant of Two Masters is performed in the style of the Commedia dell'Arte – a form of theatre which flourished throughout Europe and particularly in Italy from the early 1500's through the late 1700's. The Commedia divided the world into two groups: servants and masters. Within those two groups were a variety of stock stereotype characters who were easily identifiable by costume and mask as well as physical and vocal mannerisms. These characters were all motivated by very basic desires - love, money, food and sleep – and the plots all centered around the conflict caused by each trying to satisfy those needs. Comic business (*lazzi*), slapsticks, asides to the audience, and clownish servants (*zanni*) were standard features.

THEATRE AT UAB

With this production, Theatre UAB closes its 2001-2002 season. We have taken you from the melodrama of *The Passion of Dracula* to the sophisticated comedy of *Hay Fever* to the sci-fi expressionism of *R.U.R.* to the cynical and zany theatricalism of *Anton in Show Business*, and finally, the *Commedia dell'Arte* world of *The Servant of Two Masters*. Next year's season, which appears on the back of this program, will expand our offerings to six productions and will prove to be equally diverse in style.

But, this is only a portion of what we do in theatre at UAB:

- The 13th Street Ensemble, our professional theatre in residence, will produce its second season this summer (more information on this is in the following pages).
- Our tour groups The Bookends, The Cabaret, The Shakespeare Ensemble and The Kids on the Block have presented over 300 performances at more than 100 schools throughout Alabama this year.
- Over a dozen low-budget and no-budget productions have been created this year.
- A marathon staged reading of Bram Stoker's *Dracula* was presented at the Vamp & Tramp Booksellers (expect more in the future).
- Actors, designers and technicians are regularly called upon for national and local film projects, festivals and galas, and to provide behind-the-scenes assistance to the Department of Music's opera productions, including this year's beautiful *La Boheme*.
- And currently, plans are underway to create a radio soap opera.

We are actively working to build partnerships and working relationships throughout the university, the community and the state. We do this because we firmly believe that the theatre has a vital role to play (no pun intended) in defining and in celebrating our society, our culture, our heritage, our values, our beliefs, our dreams, our desires and our futures as citizens of this community, this state, this nation, this world and this universe.
