

### **Dramaturgical Notes**

by Jordan Reeves

Although heralded as one of the greatest Romanian playwrights, Eugene Ionesco (1909-1994) lived most of his life in France and wrote drama in French. Ionesco holds a special place in the post-World-War-II avant-garde movement known as Theatre of the Absurd. The dramatic trend he started with his first play, *The Bald Soprano* (1948), emphasizes the "absurdity of human existence by employing disjointed, repetitious, and meaningless dialogue, purposeless and confusing situations, and plots that lack realistic or logical development" (The Free Dictionary, online). Ionesco's *Rhinoceros* (1959) demonstrates all of these characteristics but also adds a significant dose of social criticism and political awareness.

On January 25, 1960, *Rhinoceros* premiered at the Odéon in Paris under the direction of famous actor-director Jean Louis Barrault. Shortly after that it was produced in London under the direction of Orson Welles, starring Lawrence Olivier in the part of Berenger. The peculiar collaboration between these two powerful creative forces inspired Austin Pendleton's full length play *Orson's Shadow*. At first, *Rhinoceros* was not well-received., but it gained world fame with its Broadway production, starring Zero Mostel and Eli Wallach. In 1974, the play was made into a film by famous Broadway director Tom O'Horgan, with Zero Mostel as Jean and Gene Wilder as Berenger.

### **Dramaturgical Notes**, continued

Rhinoceros undoubtedly reflects Ionesco's personal experience and worldview. The writer struggled through his childhood, trying to understand his place in a broken bicultural family. For the rest of his life, Ionesco was seeking to reconcile his "conflicting cultural and linguistic natures"—the Romanian and French one—which ultimately made him see the world as estranged, kaleidoscopic, and absurd (Matei Calinescu, East European Politics and Societies: Ionesco and Rhinoceros). At age of 13, Ionesco moved to Romania, where his father was able to provide him with a good education. During the 16 years he spent in Romania, Ionesco witnessed the rise of Fascism and the succumbing of local people, including his father, to this inhumane ideology sustained by a primitive and bureaucratic state. The writer solidified his political and social positions which heavily influenced his later works, including Rhinoceros.

Our production invites the viewers to engage in self-investigation of their own political and moral beliefs as they watch Berenger's conflict with a unifying, menacing, and ludicrous social environment.
